





## *Two BC students receive BP Goal Scholarships*

We're pleased to announce that Riley White and Cordell Woods were both each recognized as BP GOAL Scholarship recipients for the 2012-2013 school year.

The Georgia GOAL Scholarship Program's BP-GOAL Scholars Fund awarded 15 scholarships, enabling qualifying students to attend Georgia private schools beginning in 2012-2013. BP and its Castrol subsidiary longtime education supporters, and have embarked on the new scholarship program in connection with Georgia GOAL to provide Georgia with more options for the education of their children.

Here at Benedictine to have one student chosen is a huge deal, but to have two students receive this honor is an incredible accomplishment.

Each award amount is based on the tuition rate at the individual student's chosen private school and his or her family's demonstrated need. BP-GOAL scholars must reapply each year for the continuation of these awards, which if awarded over the next four years, could result in cumulative total of \$372,000 being awarded to all scholarship recipients. To be eligible, applicants had to be enrolled in a Georgia public school, qualify for free and reduced-price lunch through the National School Lunch Program and have been accepted and sponsored by a qualified private school.

The Georgia GOAL Scholarship Program is the state's leading student scholarship organization. Providing children throughout the state with Greater Opportunities for Access to Learning (GOAL). The program has awarded more than 6,000 scholarships totaling more than \$22.3 million dollars since 2008.

# *Redication of Alumni Hall*

Three years ago the Alumni Association Board issued a challenge: How can we get more alumni involved in our beloved BC? As the senior member of the Board that year, I suggested that we take a look at the class composites. Recalling my days as a youngster running around the halls of the Bull Street campus, I had a vivid memory of my Dad's [Frank '43] and five uncle's photos on those walls. It meant something to the graduates, their families and friends. Their photos served as a tangible link to the school. Somehow that tradition was lost on the journey from Bull Street to Seawright Drive.

Years later, perhaps when the Media Center wing was built, the old composites showed up and the tradition was restarted, although there were some gap years with no composites. There was no digital imaging back then, so the composites were made in creative ways. My 1968 class cut out the photos from two yearbooks to get the required individual head shots. In a way, the journey of the composites was very similar to the journey of the school as a whole. And so it was decided by the 2009 Board that a serious effort to locate the composites and renovate what would become Alumni Hall would be made.

First we did an inventory of the classes with composites. We were shocked to discover that 37 classes were missing and were scattered from the early years right through recent classes. We caught an early break when Tom Whalen, Jr '59 came forward with his Dad's 1928 class composite. My Uncle John had donated a Savannah Morning News copy of the '28 composite a few years earlier, but Tom came in with the original. Other classes were responding with fundraisers to create their composites and soon we had the first of four unveiling ceremonies. We were excited to see how these unveiling ceremonies brought many alumni, their families and friends back to the campus. We actually unveiled each class composite during those ceremonies, and had the guys talk about their classmates, accomplishments and experiences. After the 4 unveilings, we counted 26 new composites on the walls.

More important than the numbers, we were proud to have the alumni back on campus. At those unveilings the fight song would break out, and of course there was no shortage of humor. Some tears were shed as personal BC experiences were shared and class members no longer with us were recalled. The Class of 1988 invited the family of their deceased classmate, Jeff Mascunana, to share in their unveiling. Jeff was killed in an automobile accident the night before he was to graduate from the U.S. Naval Academy. Jeff's family was very appreciative of their inclusion, and Jeff's photo will insure that his memory is kept alive. At the recent Alumni Hall renovation unveiling, we added a perpetual plaque honoring all Benedictine alumni who graduated from the five U.S. military academies. Jeffrey W. Mascunana, U.S. Naval Academy 1992, is prominently listed on that plaque.

Every class from 1928 to 2012 is hanging on the walls to be enjoyed during casual visits, reunions and open houses. To insure that all classes going forward are represented, in 2010 we established a Senior Breakfast held just before graduation each year featuring an alumni speaker and the unveiling of the new class composite. We will continue to search for the 11 missing classes [1904 – 1927] and ask that families look through their personal archives for them and other memorabilia. We are pleased that Alumni Hall is up to date with many new features, but it will never be completed as future classes continue to grow our tradition.

# Campus Ministry

One of the dirtiest words in the English language, and probably in every language is the word ‘responsibility.’ If one has responsibility for some thing or someone that means that they are answerable for that person or thing. It is true that some seek to be responsible for certain things in their lives. They are willing to be answerable to someone for what they do. When one has responsibility for something they have assumed power over that thing or person. Many seek power because they want to be in control of things. They want to dictate how things will go and usually they want things to go according to their own will. Politics, religion, companies, etc. are just some examples of areas where power is sought. However, when they get into positions of responsibility where they can use their power they sometimes don’t want to be answerable to those who put them in power. They want to exercise a free hand in their doings and not be accountable for their words or actions. It is here that responsibility, being answerable to someone for something, becomes a “dirty” word.



The refusal to be answerable for our words or deeds is rampant in our society today. When something goes wrong and people are called to account for it they try to squirm out of it rather than accepting responsibility for what they have done. They create excuses for why they did what they did. Often they blame other people for their failures. The “blame game” has been played from the beginning of human history. It started in the Garden of Eden when God called Adam on the carpet for having eaten from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil which He had forbade the man and the woman to eat. Adam was not about to accept responsibility for what he had freely chosen to do so he blamed Eve for it. She quickly shifted the blame to the serpent who had tricked her into eating the fruit. None of them took the stance of President Truman who said: “The buck stops here.”

Here at Benedictine we attempt to go against the tide by teaching that our words and actions have consequences. We are responsible for what we say and do. If one does wrong they are taught to be honest about it and admit it. Of course, they don’t always do this because there is a punishment involved when one does wrong and they don’t like that. The punishment hopefully is administered in order to set things right before they go much further and cause even bigger problems for themselves and others. It takes courage at times to admit that you are wrong in some matter and because of this there are frequently cover ups to hide the fact that some wrong has been done. As we have seen in our society often these cover ups are elaborate.

At times it is painful to own up to our faults and failings, nonetheless as has been said, “Confession is good for the soul.” Ultimately we will not be able to avoid having our deeds exposed. Any number of times in the Scriptures we read where in the end we will stand before God and be held accountable for what we have done in this life whether good or bad. And there is no fooling God who knows all. After this comes God’s judgment on how we have lived and with it comes a reward or punishment.

All of the above would be a sad case if one could only expect punishment for wrongdoing to which we are all prone, but this is not the whole story. Yes we are inclined to do wrong and perhaps often to try to avoid accepting blame for it, but as Christians we know that when we stand before the Lord and confess our wrongdoing and repent of it, we will be forgiven for it. God is just but He is also infinitely merciful and His mercy issues forth because of His love for us, as St. John tells us in the Gospel: “God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son,” to save us from our sins. Let us praise God for His merciful love, and strive to act responsibly in carrying out His will in our lives. If we do this we will experience the peace that Christ felt as He went about His Father’s business. Amen.

# JROTC ACADEMIC AWARDS


JROTC Academic Awards Presented:

## Technology at BC

When I started teaching writing in the late 1980's, computer labs were just being built in colleges and high schools. There was a great deal of excitement about how schools might use technology for writing, but no set plans. Years later technology is an integral part of writing at BC.

As an example I offer the following summary from my AP Language class.

Students began by reading their assignment and sample articles at my blog ([www.zeugmatica.blogspot.com](http://www.zeugmatica.blogspot.com)). Not only did they get the assignment at the site, but they were required to do their earliest drafting in the form of a response comment entered at the blog.

The next week at school students were scheduled into the computer lab for three days. They composed their essays at a Google Drive site, so that all draft work was saved "in the cloud." No more excuses like "my hard drive crashed" or "the dog devoured my thumb drive!" When drafts were finished, they shared the essay via Google drive with me. I sent them comments and the grade back to them via email.

In class we can easily bring up writing samples and show them on the Smart Board. At this stage of the process, students tend to bog down. Revision is the hardest part of writing. Technology at BC helps me to engage students and keep them focused during this trying phase.

Finally, students complete a second draft. This time they share it with the class, so that everyone can easily read everyone else's paper. This last step is crucial. It turns the classroom into a community of writers who share ideas and strategies, real intellectuals who work together to learn.


